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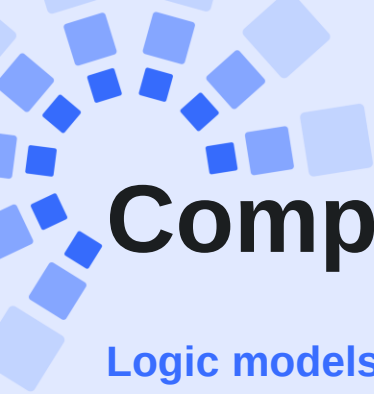
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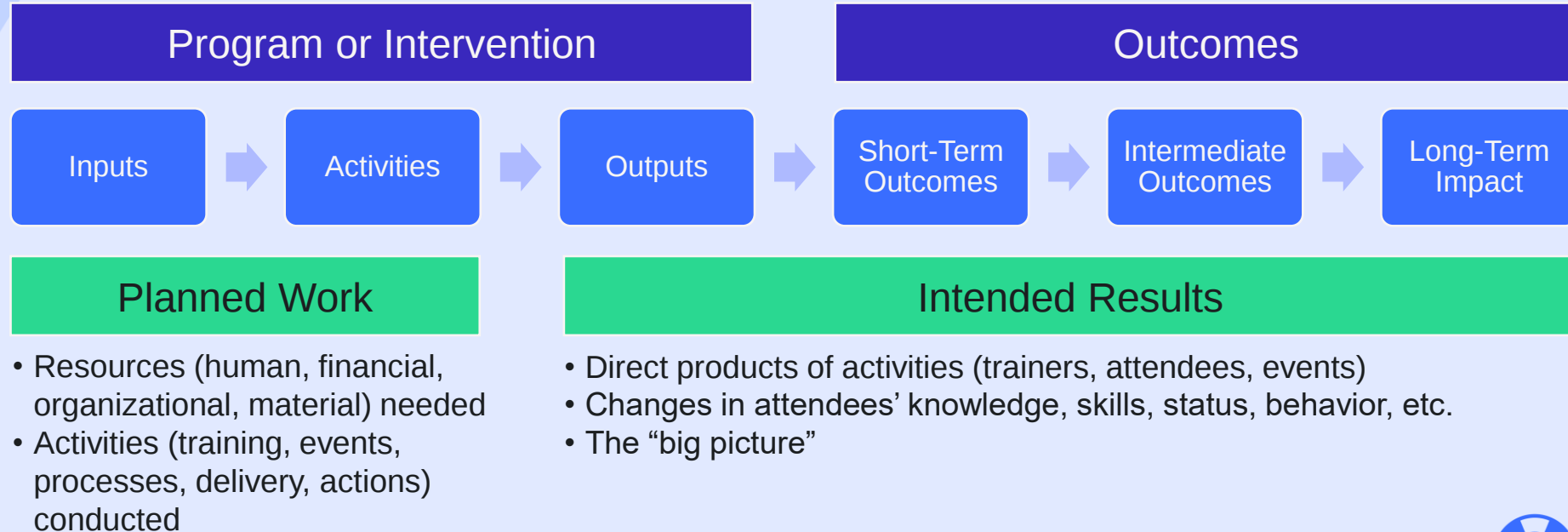
Components

Logic models are one-page, iterative documents intended to adapt and change with your program or intervention.

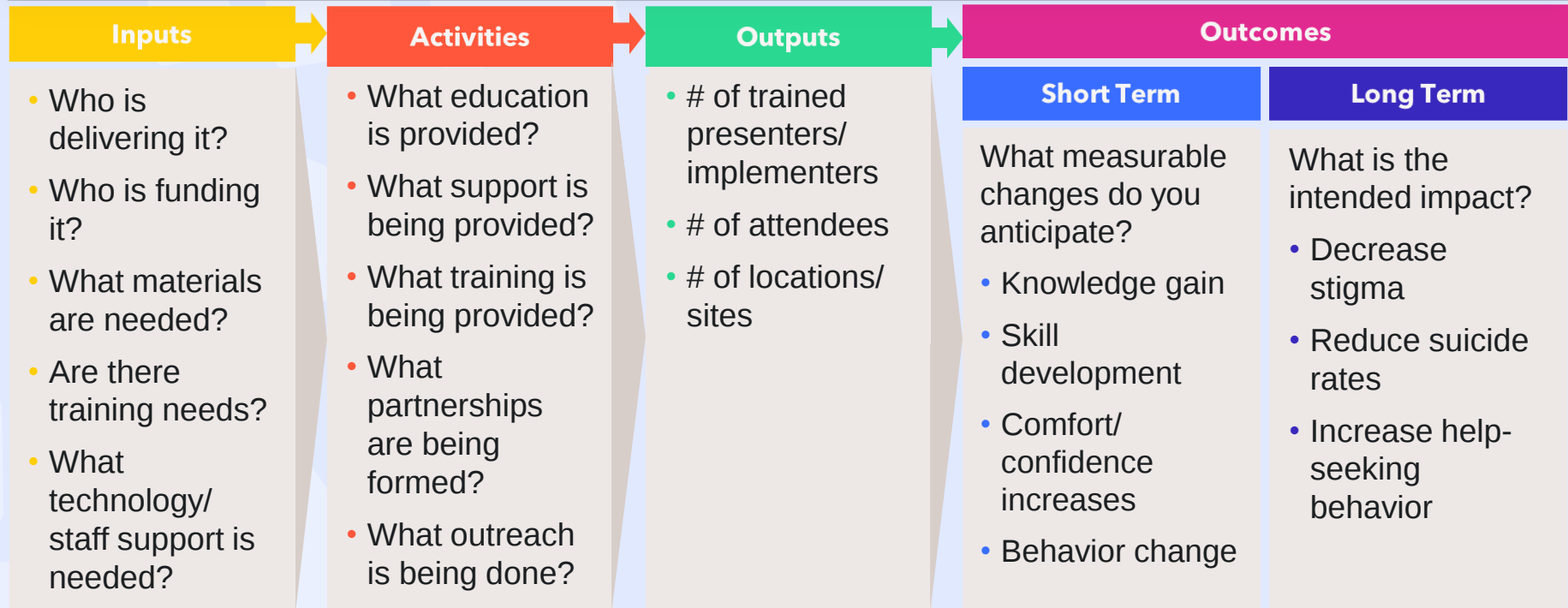

General Layout and Terminology

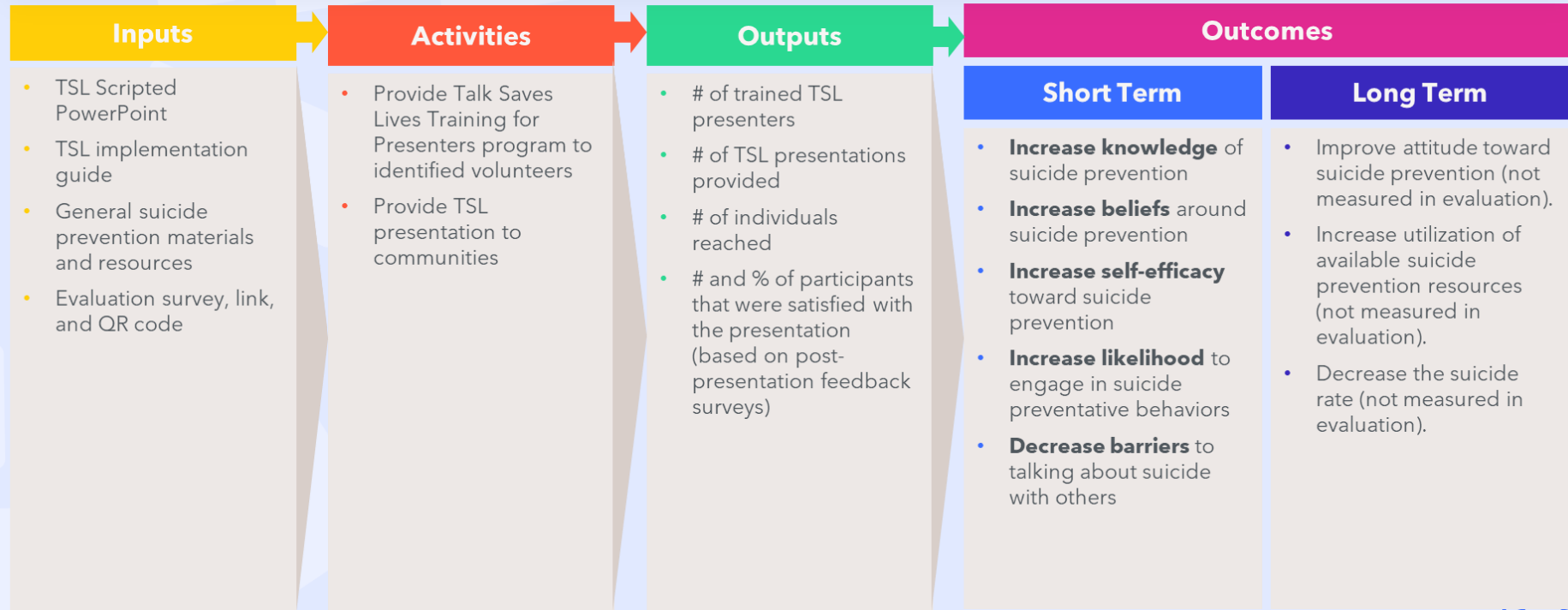


Goal: What is the overarching intention of the program or intervention?
