The Risks and Regulation of Worship

Religious worship as "super-spreader events"

- Prolonged indoor exposure
- Singing and chanting

States varied in their approach to regulating worship

Regulations varied across jurisdictions and during the pandemic
At least 143 judicial decisions were issued by July 1, 2022

Looking Forward:

Religious practices & pandemic measures will often conflict

Conflicts heighten when there is political & social conflict about public health measures

It is risky for governments to regulate worship or deny religious exemptions .

Persuasion and messaging become even more important.
