Harvey Fineberg, M.D., Ph.D. -NAM Gordon and Betty Moore Foundation

Harvey V. Fineberg is president of the Gordon and Betty Moore Foundation. He previously served as president of the U.S. National Academy of Medicine (previously Institute of Medicine), as provost of Harvard University, and as dean of the Harvard Chan School of Public Health. Prior to joining a philanthropic foundation, he devoted most of his academic career to the fields of health policy and medical decision-making. His past research has focused on global health, assessment of medical technology, evaluation and use of vaccines, response to pandemics, and dissemination of medical innovations. Dr. Fineberg previously chaired the boards of the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace and the William and Flora Hewlett Foundation. He chairs the board of the Science Philanthropy Alliance, is a member of the China Medical Board, and served on the boards of the Josiah Macy, Jr. Foundation and the Association FXB (USA). He helped found and served as president of the Society for Medical Decision Making. Dr. Fineberg serves on the editorial board of the New England Journal of Medicine and in a number of advisory capacities, including the foresight committee of the Veolia Environment Institute and scientific advisory board of the Singapore National Research Foundation. He chairs the advisory board of the Peterson Center on Healthcare, co-chairs the inaugural international advisory board of Tsinghua University Vanke School of Public Health and chairs the U.S. National Academies standing committee on emerging infectious diseases and 21st century health threats. Dr. Fineberg is co-author of the books Clinical Decision Analysis, Innovators in Physician Education, and The Epidemic That Never Was, an analysis of the controversial U.S. immunization program against swine flu in 1976. He has coedited books on such diverse topics as AIDS prevention, vaccine safety, understanding risk in society, and global health and has authored numerous articles published in professional journals. Dr. Fineberg is the recipient of several honorary degrees, the Frank A. Calderone Prize in Public Health, and the Henry G. Friesen International Prize in Health Research.

Stuart Feldman, Ph.D Schmidt Sciences

Stuart Feldman is President of Schmidt Sciences, where he is responsible for the Scientific Knowledge programs, including creating fellowship programs, supporting nascent innovative research projects, and driving new platforms and larger research projects that aim to change the way scientific research is done. Stuart did his academic work in astrophysics and mathematics and earned his AB at Princeton and his PhD at MIT. Stuart is best known for writing "Make" and other essential tools. He was awarded an honorary Doctor of Mathematics by the University of Waterloo. He is former President of ACM (Association for Computing Machinery) and former member of the board of directors of the AACSB (Association to Advance Collegiate Schools of Business). He received the 2003 ACM Software System Award. He is a Fellow of the IEEE, ACM, and AAAS. He is Board Chair of the Center for the Minorities and Disabled in IT, serves on a number of university

advisory boards and National Academy panels, and has served on a wide variety of government advisory committees.

Kathleen Hall Jamieson, Ph.D.- NAS

University of Pennsylvania

Kathleen Hall Jamieson is the Elizabeth Ware Packard Professor of Communication at the University of Pennsylvania's Annenberg School for Communication, the Walter and Leonore Annenberg Director of the University's Annenberg Public Policy Center, and Program Director of the Annenberg Foundation Trust at Sunnylands. She is the co-founder of FactCheck.org and its subsidiary site, SciCheck, and director of The Sunnylands Constitution Project, which has produced more than 30 award-winning films on the Constitution for high school students. In 2020, the National Academy of Sciences awarded Jamieson its Public Welfare Medal for her "nonpartisan crusade to ensure the integrity of facts in public discourse and development of the science of scientific communication to promote public understanding of complex issues." In 2021, she was the recipient of the Benjamin Franklin Founder Award. In 2022, the Roper Center for Public Opinion Research awarded Jamieson the Warren J. Mitofsky Award for Excellence in Public Opinion Research. In 2023, Jamieson was elected to the Board of Directors of the American Association for the Advancement of Science (AAAS). Jamieson is a member of the American Philosophical Society and the National Academy of Sciences, and a Distinguished Scholar of the National Communication Association. She also is a fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, the AAAS, the American Academy of Political and Social Science, and the International Communication Association. She is a past president of the American Academy of Political and Social Science.

Caitlin Bakker

University of Regina

Caitlin Bakker is the Discovery Technologies Librarian at the University of Regina, where she oversees library systems for the dissemination and discovery of scholarly resources. She has previously worked at the University of Minnesota, the University of Northern British Columbia, and Wilfrid Laurier University. She holds an MLIS from McGill University, a BA (Hons) in English from the University of British Columbia and is currently an external Ph.D. candidate at Maastricht University, where her research focuses on the representation and discovery of retractions.

Ivan Oransky, M.D. Retraction Watch

Ivan Oransky is the Editor in Chief of The Transmitter and Distinguished Journalist In Residence at New York University's Carter Journalism Institute, where he teaches medical journalism in the Science, Health, and Environmental Reporting Program. He has served as vice president of editorial at Medscape, vice president and global editorial director of MedPage Today, executive editor of Reuters Health, managing editor, online, of *Scientific American*, deputy editor of *The Scientist*, and editor-in-chief of the now-defunct *Praxis Post*. From 2017 until 2021, He served as president of the Association of Health Care Journalists. For three years, he taught in the health and medicine track at the City University of New York's Graduate School of Journalism. Oransky earned

his bachelor's at Harvard, where he was executive editor of *The Harvard Crimson*, and his MD at the New York University School of Medicine. In 2015, he was awarded the John P. McGovern Award for excellence in biomedical communication from the American Medical Writers Association, and in 2017, he received an honorary doctorate of civil laws from The University of the South (Sewanee). In 2019, the judges for the John Maddox Prize, which promotes those who stand up for science in the face of hostility, awarded him a commendation for his work at Retraction Watch.
