



- 43 institutions (varying security levels: minimum to maximum)
- 94% male inmates; 6% female inmates
- Aging population (~20 %); premature aging and development of chronic diseases
- Majority of inmates are between the ages of 18 to 39 yo (~57 % of the population)
- Diversified cultural / religious profile (32% Indigenous; 21% visible minorities)

Policy Requirements CSC follows a National policy (Commissioner Directives) that sets out the procedures to be followed by staff to meet the policy objective. CSC has a responsibility to provide nutritious and balanced meals to offenders according to established standards (Health Canada's Food Guide, DRIs). National Menu must be approved by a registered dietitian and follow National standards to ensure nutritional requirements are met as part of CSC's duty of care. Meals are a critical factor in creating a healthy penitentiary environment and healthier offenders.



AMDR are used at CSC for population-based menu planning, macronutrient

CSC has a National Menu (28-day cycle menu) that is used in all of its institutions across Canada to ensure that nutritional requirements are met.

Caloric Requirements are set based on data from the Offender Management System (OMS) to determine the mean height, weight and age of our clientele to meet needs of majority of the population.

Total Energy Expenditure (TEE) is calculated based on the Prediction Equation (Jan 2023) for men 19yrs & above at the low active PAL category. Individual customizations based on nutritional assessment and medical need.
