Information for Stakeholder Perspectives Session—Advance Sign-up Required

The National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine Committee on the Assessment of NIH Research on Women's Health is inviting stakeholders and patients to share their perspectives on gaps in women's health research, particularly across NIH Institutes and Centers. The committee is also interested in hearing about lived experiences in this domain. Specifically, the committee would appreciate input on any of the following, with a focus on how NIH can better meet the needs of women, per the purview of this committee:

- What does "women's health" mean to you? What are important considerations for how to define women's health and women's health research?
- What are the knowledge and research gaps in women's health and women's health research? What are the barriers to filling these gaps?
- What should be the most important considerations NIH should use in prioritizing the research on women's health it supports?
- From an equity perspective, what improvements may be made to NIH processes to advance health and gender equity in its research investments?
- How can NIH training and education systems and programs be improved to build and maintain a robust women's health research workforce? What are the barriers and opportunities within the current programs?
- How do the structure, systems, and review processes of NIH affect the type of and level of investments in women's health research? How could these systems be strengthened and improved to better support advances in women's health?
