Dean David B. Allison is Professor of Pediatrics and Endowed Chair through Texas Children's Hospital, as well as Chief of Nutrition and Director of the USDA-ARS Children's Nutrition Research Center at Baylor College of Medicine. Continuously NIH-funded as a PI for over 25 years, he has authored or co-authored more than 700 scientific publications. Allison is a staunch advocate for rigor in research methods and the uncompromisingly truthful communication of research findings. Awards include the Presidential Award for Excellence in Science, Mathematics, and Engineering Mentoring (2006); the Friends of Albert (Mickey) Stunkard Lifetime Achievement Award (The Obesity Society, 2021), the Harry V. Roberts Statistical Advocate of the Year Award (American Statistical Association, 2018), the Bodil M. Schmidt-Nielsen Distinguished Mentor and Scientist Award (American Physiological Society, 2023), the Alumni Award from Hofstra University (2024); and the Irving Wright Award of Distinction of the American Federation for Aging Research (2025). Allison was elected to the National Academy of Medicine in 2012.

Allison received a PhD in Psychology from Hofstra University. He has participated in various National Academies activities, including serving as a member of the National Academies Board on Science, Technology and Economic Policy as well as the Committee on Reproducibility and Replicability in Science.

Dr. Arthur "Skip" Lupia is the Vice President for Research and Innovation at the University of Michigan. His research advances understanding of decision making under uncertainty, coalition building, and science communication. His government service includes a term as Assistant Director of the National Science Foundation and head of its Social, Behavioral, and Economic Sciences Directorate. He is former Chairman of the Board of the Center for Open Science and is co-chair of the White House Office of Science and Technology Policy's Open Science Subcommittee. He has served as a Guggenheim Fellow, and Andrew Carnegie Fellow, and is a Fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

Dr. Lupia received an MA and PhD in Social Science from the California Institute of Technology. He is former chair of the National Academies Roundtable on the Application of Behavioral and Social Science Research, a former member for the National Academies Division Committee for the Behavioral and Social Sciences and Education, and winner of the 1998 National Academy of Science Award for Initiatives in Research.

Dr. Marcia McNutt is a geophysicist and as president of the National Academy of Sciences. From 2013 to 2016, she served as editor-in-chief of the Science family of journals. Prior to joining Science, she was director of the U.S. Geological Survey (USGS) from 2009 to 2013. Before joining the USGS, McNutt served as president and chief executive officer of the Monterey Bay Aquarium Research Institute (MBARI), in Moss Landing, California. Her research area is the dynamics of the upper mantle and lithosphere on geologic time scales, work that has taken her to distant continents and oceans for field observations. She is a veteran of more than a dozen deep-sea expeditions, on most of which she was chief or co-chief scientist.

Her honors include membership in the American Philosophical Society and the American Academy of Arts and Sciences. She holds honorary doctoral degrees from the Colorado College, the University of Minnesota, Monmouth University, and the Colorado School of Mines. In 1988, she was awarded the American Geophysical Union's Macelwane Medal for research accomplishments by a young scientist, and she received the Maurice Ewing Medal in 2007 for her contributions to deep-sea exploration. She is a fellow of AGU, the Geological Society of America, American Association for the Advancement of Science, and International Association of Geodesy.

McNutt received a BA in physics from Colorado College and her PhD in Earth sciences at the Scripps Institution of Oceanography.

Juan Enriquez is author and co-author of multiple bestsellers, including *As the Future Catches You: How Genomics Will Change Your Life, Work, Health, and Wealth* (Random House, 1999), *The Untied States of America: Polarization, Fracturing and Our Future* (Random House, 2005), *Evolving Ourselves: Redesigning Humanity One Gene at a Time* (Penguin, 2015), and *RIGHT/WRONG: How Technology Transforms Our Ethics* (MIT, 2020). He is a leading science communicator with eleven TED talks on a variety of subjects, as well as dozens of TEDx talks. He was the founding Director of the Harvard Business School's Life Sciences Project and is a research affiliate at MIT's synthetic neurobiology lab. Mr. Enriquez serves on multiple for-profit, non-profit boards, advisory committees and working groups including The American Academy of Arts and Sciences, WGBH, The Boston Science Museum, National Academy of Medicine, National Academy of Sciences, USDA, and Harvard's David Rockefeller Center. Dr. Steven N. Goodman is a Professor of Epidemiology, Medicine, and Health policy, Stanford University School of Medicine, and Associate Dean for Clinical and Translational Research. He is also affiliated faculty in the Stanford Center for Biomedical Ethics. He has led and continues to lead training and degree programs for graduate students, faculty, and staff for almost 30 years, many of them in the realm of professional development and ethics.

Goodman's main research and implementation focus currently is on the rigor and reproducibility of biomedical research. He has also done extensive writing and research on the foundations of scientific inference and other aspects of scientific and statistical methodology. He founded and directs the Stanford Program on Research Rigor and Reproducibility (SPORR) and co-founded METRICS (the Meta-research Innovation Center at Stanford). His honors include election to the National Academy of Medicine, the Spinoza Chair in Medicine (University of Amsterdam), and the Lilienfeld Award (American College of Epidemiology) for lifetime achievement in epidemiologic research and teaching, and election to the Johns Hopkins Society of Fellows.

Goodman received an AB from Harvard, majoring in Biochemistry and Applied Math, an MD from NYU, trained and was board-certified in pediatrics at Washington University in St. Louis, and received an MS in Biostatistics and PhD in Epidemiology from Johns Hopkins. He currently serves as a member of the National Academies On Being a Scientist Panel on Responsible Conduct and Stewardship of the Research Process.

Professor Kathleen Hall Jamieson is the Elizabeth Ware Packard Professor of Communication at the University of Pennsylvania's Annenberg School for Communication, the Walter and Leonore Annenberg Director of the University's Annenberg Public Policy Center, and Program Director of the Annenberg Retreat at Sunnylands. Jamieson has authored or co-authored 16 books, most recently *Cyberwar: How Russian Hackers and Trolls Helped Elect a President* (Oxford University Press, 2018), which won the 2019 R.R. Hawkins Award from the Association of American Publishers and was published in a revised paperback edition by Oxford University Press in June 2020.

Jamieson has won university-wide teaching awards at each of the three universities at which she has taught and has delivered the American Political Science Association's Ithiel de Sola Pool Lecture, the National Communication Association's Arnold Lecture, and the NASEM Division of Behavioral and Social Sciences and Education Henry and Bryna David Lecture. Jamieson is a member of the American Philosophical Society and the National Academy of Sciences, and a Distinguished Scholar of the National Communication Association. She also is a fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, the American Academy of Political and Social Science, and the International Communication Association.

Jamieson received an MA and PhD in Communication Arts from the University of Wisconsin-Madison. In addition to the Strategic Council, she serves as a member of the National Academies Committee on Science, Engineering, Medicine, and Public Policy.

Prior to this role, she served in numerous roles across the agency, including Deputy Director of the Office of Science Policy, and has led the development of numerous high impact science and policy initiatives such as the Brain Research through Advancing Innovative Neurotechnologies (BRAIN) Initiative and the National Center for Advancing Translational Sciences (NCATS). Dr. Jorgenson also served as the Deputy Executive Director of the White House Cancer Moonshot Task Force in the Office of the Vice President in the Obama administration, where she directed and coordinated cancer-related activities across the Federal government and worked to leverage investments across sectors to dramatically accelerate progress in cancer prevention.

Dr. Jorgenson earned a bachelor's degree in psychology from Denison University in Ohio and a PhD from the Graduate Program for Neuroscience at the University of Minnesota. She currently serves as an ex officio member of the National Academies Forum on Drug Discovery, Development and Translation and previously served as an ex officio member of the National Science, Technology, and Security Roundtable.

Masucci's research examines how the geographies of information and communication technologies impact community efficacies associated with education, health, and environmental quality both in U.S. and international contexts. Dr. Karen E. Nelson is the Chief Scientific Officer of Thermo Fisher Scientific. Prior to that she was the President of the J. Craig Venter Institute (JCVI), where she held several positions of increasing responsibility over the years, including Director of JCVI's Rockville Campus, and Director of Human Microbiology and Metagenomics in the Department of Human Genomic Medicine at the JCVI. She has authored or co-authored over 230 peer reviewed publications, edited three books, and is currently Editor-in-Chief of the journal Microbial Ecology. She has served on the Editorial Boards of PNAS Nexus, BMC Genomics, GigaScience, and the Central European Journal of Biology. She is a Fellow of the American Academy of Microbiology, an Honorary Professor at the University of the West Indies, and a Helmholtz International Fellow. Dr. Nelson is also a member of the National Academy of Sciences. Dr. Nelson has led several genomic and metagenomic efforts, including the first human metagenomics study that was published in 2006, and studies of the ecology of the gastrointestinal tract of humans and animals. In her current role she oversees the R&D operations of Thermo Fisher.

Dr. Nelson received her undergraduate degree from the University of the West Indies and her PhD in Animal Science/Microbiology from Cornell University. She currently serves as a member on the National Academies Board of Life Sciences.

Brian Nosek is Executive Director of the Center for Open Science (COS) and a professor at the University of Virginia. Brian Nosek co-developed the Implicit Association Test, a method that advanced research and public interest in implicit bias. Nosek co-founded three non-profit organizations: Project Implicit to advance research and education about implicit bias (<http://projectimplicit.net/>), the Society for the Improvement of Psychological Science to improve the research culture in his home discipline (<http://improvingpsych.org/>), and COS (<http://cos.io/>) to improve rigor, transparency, integrity, and reproducibility across research disciplines. Nosek's research and applied interests are to understand why people and systems produce behaviors that are contrary to intentions and values; to develop, implement, and evaluate solutions to align practices with values; and, to improve research credibility and cultures to accelerate progress.

Nosek received his PhD in Psychology from Yale and BS from Cal Poly San Luis Obispo in Psychology, Computer Science, and Women's Studies. He has served on the National Academies Realizing Opportunities for Advanced and Automated Workflows in Scientific Research committee.
